

Our research efforts focus on long-standing individual and structural barriers to prevention, wellness, and recovery that have been most difficult to address, and typically include unstable housing, criminal justice involvement, and substance use dependence. These factors are, in turn, intertwined with race and ethnicity, income, immigration status, language barriers, aging, and culturally based factors including various forms of stigma and discrimination that often accompany these challenging life circumstances. Testing innovative approaches (such as the use of mental health peer advocates) to improve quality service outcomes and using robust epidemiologic and services research methods are vital for achieving successful translation, implementation, and sustainability. SOC Evaluation Team Update: Implementation Rating Tool Survey

The Rating Tool survey for Implementation of the System of Care (SOC) Approach was disseminated in February 2023 and sought to evaluate the advancement made in SOC related areas to aid children, adolescents, and young adults with behavioral health challenges and their families. The survey was distributed to various SOC representatives across child-serving systems throughout New Yok State (NYS). Responses were received from 74% of counties throughout the state (46 of 62), with all NYS regions represented. Thank you to those who provided input on SOC developments in their community. This survey was also administered in 2019 and 2020, allowing for the examination of results over time. Below is a comparison of responses to the survey item asking about the implementation extent of the SOC approach in local communities or regions.

Improvement can be seen with the overall assessment of the implementation of SOC approach throughout the state over time. In 2023, 46% of respondents reported that the SOC approach was being implemented "substantially" or "extensively" in their community. This is a 10% improvement from 2020, when 36% of responders reported the SOC approach was being implemented "substantially" or "extensively" in their community, and a 9% increase from 2019. Fewer respondents indicated "don't know" or "not at all" in 2023 when asked about the implementation of SOC in the community, as compared to 2019 and 2020 results. These findings indicate positive progress and a greater awareness among individuals of SOC implementation efforts in their communities.

Did You Know?

9 million New Yorkers will need to recertify for enrollment in Medicaid, Child Health Plus and the Essential Plan between now and Spring 2024. Enrollees in these public health insurance programs have not had to renew their coverage since early 2020 due to the COVID-19 Public Health Emergency (PHE) continuous coverage requirements. However, the December 2022 federal Consolidated Appropriations Act included new rules ending the continuous coverage requirements starting Spring 2023. These new federal rules now require states, including New York State to begin redetermining eligibility for public program enrollees in the Spring of 2023. The U.S. government has announced that the Public Health Emergency (PHE) will expire at the end of the day on May 11, 2023. On the date the PHE ends, the flexibilities afforded providers regarding minimum billing standards and documentation requirements will end, unless otherwise specified by OMH through formal regulatory waivers. The current OMH Commissioner's waiver, which was last renewed on February 1, 2023, and contains the COVID-19-related flexibilities, will terminate on the same date as the PHE ends. SAMHSA Grants Available To Expand Programs For Transition-age Young Adults With SED. A Notice of Funding Opportunity is available from SAMHSA describing 15 awards totaling more than \$11 Million. Applications are due Monday, May 8, 2023. Grants are available to improve and expand access to developmentally, culturally, and linguistically appropriate services and supports for transition-aged youth and young adults (ages 16-25) who either have or are at risk for developing serious mental health conditions. Award recipients will be expected to identify and provide appropriate behavioral health interventions to transition-aged youth and young adults who are at risk for a serious emotional disturbance or serious mental illness. With this program, SAMHSA aims to improve emotional and behavioral health function so that this population of youth and young adults can maximize their potential to assume adult roles and responsibilities and lead full and productive lives.

Naloxone Available to OMH Providers. The New York State Office of Addiction Services and Supports (OASAS) has made the overdose reversal medication Naloxone (Narcan) and fentanyl test strips available to all OMH service providers. Deputy Commissioners' Corner

System of Care Values and Principles in Action

Deputy Commissioners continue to engage stakeholders in determining systems challenges that need attention, either through financing, regulatory change, or quality improvement. Most recently, this included meeting with consultants from the University of Connecticut Innovations Institute to strategize on the approach for the development of a braiding and blending toolkit targeted at localities and to assist at the state level.

The NYS Office of Mental Health (OMH) is engaged in a series of Community Engagement sessions to obtain feedback from county government, family members and caregivers, youth, community providers and other cross-system partners. Starting in February, four virtual sessions and 36 in-person sessions have been held around the state to gather qualitative data to inform OMH's design, implementation and sustaining solutions of \$1 Billion of budget initiatives to improve mental health care for New Yorkers.

Governor Hochul's plan reflects more than \$1 billion in new investments for mental health services. This includes:

- Comprehensive expansion of outpatient and community-based services, including employment supports
- Additional mental health services for school-aged children
- Increased operational capacity for inpatient programs
- Improved processes and systems accountability for evaluation, admission and discharge from inpatient and emergency programs
- 3,500 new housing units for individuals with mental illness
- Expanded insurance coverage for mental health services
- Strengthening of the mental health workforce

OMH has identified specific goals with the Community Engagement sessions:

- 1. **Gather input** from providers, community organizations, individuals and families with lived experience and other participants who understand a community's needs and challenges;
- 2. Increase access to mental health services:
- 3. Address gaps in services and geographic barriers;
- 4. Identify health disparities and promote equity; and
- 5. Improve the mental health continuum of care for all New Yorkers.

Attendance at the sessions has been robust and included stakeholders from many systems – schools, parents/caregivers, youth, community providers, law enforcement, health care, juvenile justice, child welfare, crisis, and others. Themes are emerging as analysts are collating data collected from the many conversations.

In addition to the Community Engagement sessions, the Governor's Office, OMH and the NYS Office of Children and Family Services (OCFS) are working in collaboration with Families Together in NYS and Youth Power! to convene youth forums with a focus on teenagers. We want to hear about their mental health needs, feedback on services, and where are the gaps. The first session was held in NYC and the second in Plattsburgh, with others to follow across the State. All the information will inform how best to design and implement services that meet the needs of young people.
